Homework Policy

Rationale

Primary aged children have very active and busy days in school. Participation in the broad primary curriculum develops the <u>whole</u> child and offers experiences in moral, spiritual, physical and creative areas as well as the academic. It is Brigg Primary School's policy that children should be encouraged to continue their learning at home following a regular but not excessive time-table.

Each year group has an established homework pattern and parents are informed of the timetable by the class teachers at the beginning of the academic year.

Evidence has shown that children make more progress when learning is shared and supported between school and home.

We believe that parent participation not only encourages children with specific targets but also develops an attitude to education for life.

School provides basic materials for homework. The parents and children are asked to respect these resources, e.g. reading books.

School may ask for a financial contribution from parents to replace any homework materials which may be damaged or lost.

Homework must be perceived by teachers, parents and children as an extension to the learning process and not merely an opportunity for repetition of classroom learning.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Homework is marked weekly unless it is received late.

Children are praised and rewarded for completing homework tasks through the awarding of a Class Dojo. Children not completing their homework at home will be given the opportunity to complete this in school time.
